Record of School Achievement

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) issues the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) to eligible students who leave school before completing the Higher School Certificate (HSC).

The RoSA is a cumulative credential, meaning it contains a student's record of academic achievement up until the date they leave school. This could be between the end of Year 10 up until and including some results from Year 12.

The RoSA records completed Stage 5 (Year 10) and Preliminary Stage 6 (Year 11) courses and grades, HSC (Year 12) results, and where applicable participation in any uncompleted Preliminary Stage 6 courses or HSC courses.

The RoSA is useful to students leaving school prior to the HSC because they can show it to potential employers or places of further learning.

Eligibility for a RoSA

To be eligible for a RoSA, students must have:

- Completed the mandatory curriculum requirements for Years 7 to 10 (All course mandatory hours can be found on the NSW NESA website)

- Completion of all assessment tasks to a minimum standard.
- Completion of all coursework to a minimum standard.

- Maintaining an overall and class attendance rate as specified in the Department of Education School Attendance policy (85% or higher overall).

Students who do not qualify for a RoSA

- Students who leave school without finishing Year 10 are not eligible for a RoSA.

- Students have been issued an 'N' determination for ONE mandatory curriculum course

If students don't complete a course's requirements in both assessments and/or coursework they will receive an 'N' determination.

'N' Determinations

If students don't complete a course's requirements, they will receive an 'N' determination.

Students are warned via a letter from Granville South CAPA High School if it looks like they might receive an 'N' determination *(failure to complete a minimum of 50% of assessment task equivalency or 50% of overall coursework).* This aims to give the student time to complete the course requirements and rectify the problem.

If a student is given an 'N' determination in <u>ONE</u> curriculum course, they will not be eligible for a RoSA and will need to repeat Year 10 to continue their education.
